Executive Summary

GOVERNOR: Continued to speak about the governor's request to judges to consider the early release of non-violent offenders who are within 120 days of the end of their sentence to help mitigate the risk of COVID19 illness and death in a prison population.

Dr. Acton urged the public to continue to heed the stay at home order. The result of easing up on the stay at home order would be that our cases would spike and easily overwhelm hospitals.

After the team led by General Harris visited various locations and assessed for things such as distance to an existing hospital, conditions safe for patients and health care professionals, and space to meet the region's expected needs, the following sites have been selected to increase the bed capacity within Ohio:

- Seagate Convention Center, Lucas County
- Case Western University's Health Education Campus, Cuyahoga County
- Dayton Convention Center, Montgomery County
- Covelli Convention Ctr, Mahoning County
- Duke Energy Convention Ctr, Hamilton County
- Greater Columbus Convention Ctr, Franklin County

Emergency Management Agency

We would like to thank everyone who has donated PPE and other supplies to our health care workers and first responders through the EMA. We are continuing to accept donations of the following items: N95 masks, surgical/procedure masks, gowns, goggles, face shields, eye protection, disinfectant wipes, hand sanitizer, bulk disinfectant, bulk hand soap, Isopropyl alcohol, Lysol concentrated cleaners and thermometers. Blood Collection

The American Red Cross now faces a severe blood shortage due to an unprecedented number of blood drive cancellations in response to the coronavirus outbreak. **Blood donation is considered an essential service** to ensure the health of the community and is listed as an exception in the state order. While everyone is being asked to avoid mass gatherings, it's very important to note that blood drives are **not** considered "mass gatherings."

City of Tiffin

Mayor's Message: All City of Tiffin Municipal buildings shall remain closed to the public, except for employees of the city through the end of day May 1, 2020. This closure includes family members of city employees, friends of city employees, members of the general public, and employees currently on any sort of leave. Current employees should only enter and exit other buildings and offices within the city government if absolutely necessary. This includes all playgrounds and the city compost facility.

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Job and Family Services

For the week ending March 28, 2020, the Ohio Department of Job and Family Services reported 272,117 initial jobless claims to the U.S. Dept. of Labor, which set a record for the second straight week. The number of initial jobless claims filed in Ohio over the last two weeks stands at 468,414. To put that in perspective, 364,603 initial jobless claims were filed during the entire YEAR in 2019. Over these last two weeks, we have issued unemployment compensation payments totaling more than \$45 million to more than 108,000 claimants.

Administration

Andrew Saul, Commissioner of Social Security, reminds the public that Social Security and Supplemental Security Income (SSI) benefit payments will continue to be paid on time during the COVID-19 pandemic. The agency also reminds everyone to be aware of scammers who try to take advantage of the pandemic to trick people into providing personal information or payment via retail gift cards, wire transfers, internet currency, or by mailing cash, to maintain Social Security benefit payments or receive economic impact payments from the Department of the Treasury.

“Social Security will pay monthly benefits on time and these payments will not be affected by the COVID-19 pandemic,” Commissioner Saul said. “I want our beneficiaries to be aware that scammers may try to trick you into thinking the pandemic is stopping or somehow changing your Social Security payments, but that is not true. Don’t be fooled.”
