Executive Summary

GOVERNOR: During today's press conference, Governor DeWine stated that we cannot control how fast the vaccine comes to Ohio, but we can control how fast we get it out. When hospitals get the vaccine, they are asked to ensure that the vaccinations are administered within 24 hours and report that information back to the state.

Governor DeWine gave an update on the case incidence and regional COVID ICU utilization. All regions of the state have at least 1/5 of their ICU patients who are positive for COVID-19. In most regions, 1/3 or more patients in the ICU are COVID positive.

Governor DeWine announced that prelim results from Ohio Schools COVID-19 Evaluation Team found if students in class are masked/distanced, they did not have an increased risk of catching the virus from a nearby positive student. Schools should continue to quarantine exposed students if

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masking/distancing protocols were not followed. This change doesn't apply to after-school activities, including sports.

OHIO DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH: ODH has extended the 10:00 PM to 5:00 AM statewide curfew for another three weeks, until January 23, 2021. This is because we do not know what effect the holidays may have on the hospitals and health care systems.

COVID-19 VACCINATION DASHBOARD: The COVID-19 Vaccination Dashboard is now live, and displays the most recent data reported to the Ohio Department of Health regarding the number of individuals that have started and completed the COVID-19 vaccination series by various demographics and county of residence. This dashboard is available on the coronavirus.ohio.gov website, and will be updated daily.

TESTING LOCATIONS: Seneca County is currently in the process of scheduling pop up testing. Date is tentatively scheduled with the National Guard in January.

DeWine has started a walk-up/drive-up testing initiative with the Ohio Association of Community Health Centers and their affiliate members and the Ohio National Guard. These sites will also include other local community-based organizations i.e., faith-based organizations, community centers, food pantries, etc.

Testing for this initiative will be available for individuals with or without symptoms. The test has no out-of-pocket cost to the patient and individuals of any age are able to access the test. Minors will need signed consent of a parent/guardian.

The Health Commissioner reports that 73 vaccines have been administered with full schedule on Tuesday, December 29 and nearly full schedule on Wednesday, December 30th. A new batch of 100 doses of vaccine were received on Monday the 28th. The department is working through all those in phase 1a that want the vaccine and will move to phase 1b which includes the following: Ohioans 65 years-old and older; those living with severe congenital, developmental, or early-onset medical disorders; and adults who work in schools. Seneca County Health Commissioner will produce Facebook Live videos with updates from the Health District. This will occur at 10:30 on the second and fourth Wednesday of the month. Videos will be archived on Facebook and can be viewed live on the Health Department's and Commissioner's FB pages.

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What do you do if you have symptoms of COVID? Contact your doctor. If you don't have a doctor, but have insurance, check to see if your insurance has tele-health and see a doctor. If your doctor does not recommend a COVID test but you need one, call the Tiffin Community Health Center, 419.455.8140 and make an appointment.

PCR swab tests may take 4-6 days to return results as they must be sent to a lab and be cultured to test for the virus. Rapid tests have a much shorter return time, but are in short supply. No test is 100% accurate. The test relies on, among other things, the amount of virus in your system at the time of the test. Tests are available at the following locations:

Key Points:

- Regionally, there are 605 COVID-19 patients with 338 (56%) in Lucas County hospitals, 84 (14%) in Allen County hospitals, and the remaining 182 (30%) from other NW Ohio counties
- Regionally, there are 163 COVID-19 Critical Care patients with 107 (66%) in Lucas County hospitals, 13 (8%) in Allen County hospitals, and the remaining 47 (26%) from other NW Ohio counties
- Out of 38 regional hospitals reporting, 20 hospitals reported strained or critical nursing shortages (53%)
- The statewide median age for COVID-19 is 43 years old
- The statewide 7-day average positivity rate for testing is 12.6%
